With the help of 200+ volunteers and 120+ foster homes, we took in 702 cats and dogs in 2021.



Operation Pet Solutions, Community Clinic

In October we held our first community clinic utilizing grant funding from the ASPCA & Subaru Loves Pets program. The Pawsitively Free Pet Vaccine and Microchip Clinic was a huge success. We are so grateful to the ASPCA, Subaru and our wonderful partners at Chatham Parkway Subaru and National Spay Alliance Savannah for their support. In just one day we impacted the lives of 67 cats and dogs.



In addition to providing pets with necessary vaccines, OLAR provided 43 spay/neuter vouchers, fitted 20+ dogs with harnesses, provided dog and cat food, cat litter, and crates/carriers to those in need. We know that there are great pet owners right here in our community that just need a little extra help, and we want to provide that for them. This event allowed us to tackle the overcrowding of shelters from several angles – (1) free microchips will reunite pets with their owners quickly and keep beloved pets from ending up in the shelter system, (2) free spays and neuters will decrease pet overpopulation by preventing unwanted litters, and (3) pet owners in need found a partner in One Love Animal Rescue's Operation Pet Solutions allowing them to keep their companions instead of being forced to surrender them.
